

Please plan to attend our next meeting on Thursday, January 19, 2023. I will look forward to seeing you!







SANFORD DONALD OBITUARY



Donald DeForest "Bud" Sanford October 5, 1923 - December 9, 2022

Modesto, California - Donald DeForest Sanford, 99, passed away Friday evening, December 9th at the Bethel Retirement Community in Modesto due to age related health issues. Donald was a native of Portland, Oregon. "Bud", "Buddie", "PaPa", "Grandpa", or "Don", as he was called by friends and family was the second of two children, born October 5, 1923 to Horace and Mildred Barstow Sanford. As a youngster he was a paper boy, a Portland bicycle delivery boy and a Boy Scout. He attended Franklin High School and in 1942, after graduation, started work as a shipyard welder in Portland.

In February 1943, Bud enlisted in the Army Air Corp as an aviation cadet under a program for high school graduates passing an entrance exam. He trained in Nebraska, Iowa, California and Arizona, winning his wings in 1944. He was promoted to Flight Officer that year and trained in the P-39 single engine fighter. In early 1945 he trained in a twin engine fighter, the Lockheed P-38 Lightning and in July was sent overseas to join the 49th Fighter Group, 8th Fighter Squadron stationed at Lingayen, Philippines, and then le Shima, Okinawa. He was promoted to 2nd Lt. in Okinawa. During Japan's occupation he was stationed at Atsugi Army Air Base and assigned to the 63rd Air Service Group where he piloted multi engine transports and bombers including the C-47, B-25 and B-17. He returned home to Portland in June 1946. After release from the Air Corps he was assigned to the Army Air Force Reserves and promoted to 1st Lt. in May of 1951.

Donald attended Oregon State College from 1946 to 1950; was a member of Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity and graduated in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science in Food Technology. He met his beautiful wife "Bobbie", Barbara Jane Baker, while attending college, marrying her on August 28, 1948. They had their first child while Bud was studying for finals in 1949. Destined to meet each other after the war, Bud found that he and Bobbie had both been Portland shipyard welders at the same place and time.

After graduation the "romance" of wine making drew Don to Modesto, California and a job at E & J Gallo Winery. He and his small family moved to Modesto in 1950 where they had three more children. He worked at Gallo for many years as an enologist, and later worked as the Winery Compliance Director and finally as Brandy Plant Manager. Don retired from Gallo after forty years in 1990 making many lifelong friends.

While working at Gallo, Don served in the California National Guard from 1955 until his full retirement in August 1983. He served as an Aviation Officer and pilot in the Guard, being promoted to Captain in June 1961 and to Major in January 1967. He flew a variety of fixed wing aircraft every month to keep his pilot rating current, and was trained as a rotor wing pilot at Fort Walters, Texas in 1962.

After retirement, Don never stopped moving and had an exceptional number of interests, hobbies and travels. He and his wife Bobbie traveled the US in their RV doing genealogy research, taking photographs and enjoying the country. He traveled to Japan, South East Asia, China and Italy to mention a few. His favorite place in the world was Yosemite and favorite thing to do was to be with friends and family, but most of all he loved to fly.

Don was a member of St. Dunstan's Episcopal Church, and later St. Paul's Episcopal Church where he served in many positions, including writing the church newsletter. Don's affiliations include the American Society of Enologists, Institute of Food Technologists, Exchange Club, American Legion, Sons of the American Revolution, Sons in Retirement, P-38 Association, Commemorative Air Force, Press & Publications for McHenry Historical Society, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Modesto PC Users Group and so many more. His hobbies included woodworking, PC computers, desktop publishing, genealogy, stamp collecting, coin collecting, photography, sailing, reading, history and gardening.

Don was proceeded in death by his wife Bobbie in 2003. He is survived by four children, Stephen Sanford (Sarah) of Citrus Heights, Stuart Sanford (Lora) of Woodbridge, Virginia, Francine Wister (Dennis) and Rex Sanford (Rhonda) of Modesto; nine grandchildren; ten great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held January 17, 2023 at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, 1528 Oakdale Rd., Modesto, at 10:00 am. There will be a burial ceremony at Lakewood Memorial Park starting at 1:30 pm. Remembrances in lieu of flowers may be made in his name to any of the following charities:

Ancestry.com is a massive database.

It is one of the oldest genealogy for profit companies and is most likely to have the historical data you would be looking for.

In addition to typical genealogy records, you can also receive an easy DNA test through Ancestry.com or use the website to locate the grave of a loved one.

DNA tests are an effective way to see what you have in common with your ancestors.

Ancestry.com has over 10 billion records and 3 million paying subscribers.

FamilySearch.org is a non-profit whose mission is to help everyone discover their family history.

They are a database of records that are generally successful in crafting a family tree for its users.

They believe that knowing your family tree is important to living a fulfilling life, and it is an opportunity that everyone deserves.

Because FamilySearch is a mission-based non-profit, they do have limitations to the services they provide. The non-profit is founded by The Church of Latter-Day Saints, and they offer several styles of service:

- Online records
- In person help
- Mobile apps

Archives.gov is a bit different from the other options because it puts you in charge of being your own genealogist.

It is also tailored to American citizens as it is an archive by the United States government.

MyHeritage.com is similar to Ancestry.com in how it functions.

To begin experiencing it, you will need to sign up for a free trial or start a paid subscription. Once you do this, you will be gaining access to billions of records.

FindMyPast.com is not useful for North Americans whose origins are from elsewhere, but it is highly useful for people who could use their data and otherwise would not have access to it.

LegacyTree.com is a unique style of genealogy research site than the ones we have previously seen.
