

Former Member Passes - Dr. John Dennis Loeffler January 15, 1932 - December 9, 2022

Sacramento, California - John Dennis Loeffler was born to John William Albert Loeffler and Genevieve "Dolly" Loeffler



(nee Behnke) in Watertown, Wisconsin on January 15, 1932. At home he went by "Dennis" so he and his father would know who was being called when they heard "Johnny!" Dad had a textbook Midwestern upbringing, going to school, working at his grandparents' greenhouse, and attending services at St. Henry's Episcopal Church on Sundays.

After high school Dad was admitted to the University of Wisconsin, Madison where he obtained his B.A. in Medical Science (1954), married Norma Arlene Smith (1956) and was awarded his M.D. (1958). Then he was off to Washington University School of Medicine and Barnes Hospital in St. Louis for three years, two as a resident and one as a Fellow in Neurology. The US Army then invited him to spend a couple years (October 1962 – October 1964) at Martin Army Hospital at Ft. Benning, where rumor has it, he didn't like wearing his hat. Somehow, between med school and the Army he and Norma had the time and energy to have two children, son Bill, followed by daughter Leslie - both survive him.

Despite not wearing his hat, he was honorably discharged, whereupon he packed up the car, wife and kids and departed for the medical center at UC San Francisco. While there he was introduced to a young neurosurgeon named John Darroch and in 1966 was convinced to move to Modesto and enter practice together. Initially their offices were in Sealy Tower but on July 10, 1969 they broke ground for their new offices at the Downey Park Professional Center where they spent long hours over several decades tending to their patients.

Dennis and Norma divorced in 1969 but his bachelor days were not long as one day while on rounds at Doctor's Hospital, he met a nurse, Peggy Collins (nee Enright). He and Peggy married in 1974 and the family grew to include Peggy's 5 daughters, Marilyn, Joanne, Suzanne, Nancy and Judy – all of whom survive him. He is also survived by his sister Llani, along with many grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

In the rare moments when he was not attending to his patients, he enjoyed working with stained glass, doing extensive genealogical research, travel, collecting books and reading (and reading and reading) ... and peach yogurt, with lots of whipped cream (demonstration to occur at the funeral).

Dad passed away on December 9, 2022 in his Sacramento home and re-joined his wife of 45 years, Margaret "Peggy" Loeffler, who passed in the Modesto family home on July 1, 2019.

We will all miss him greatly.

A gathering of family and friends at Lakewood Funeral Home on January 6, 2023 at 11:00 am is being arranged. Details will be posted on the funeral home website when known.

It's happening again. The United States Customs and Immigration Service's (USCIS) genealogy division is proposing a substantial rate hike.

Deadline for comments: March 6, 2023

You can read about the proposed fees in the Federal Register—search for "genealogy" until you reach section "P. Genealogy and Records" or "Table 23."

- 1. Read the proposal and think about the comments you can make (see some helpful suggestions).
- 2. Add your thoughts to the <u>public comment section of the Federal Register page</u>—with a heading that includes "Section P. Genealogy and Records" as there are many other items in this proposal.
- 3. Let your senators and congressional representative know your thoughts by sending them a copy of your public comment—find your representatives here. Writing Group



Modesto's Oldest Church

HISTORYVIEW FEBRUARY 2023 CLINTON CHAPEL – A.M.E. ZION CHURCH MODESTO'S OLDEST CHURCH BY Harrison Power





Tucked among the residential streets of West Modesto stands the Clinton Chapel A.M.E Zion Church. From the exterior, the modest wooden church seems unchanged from when it was originally built. Located at 1024 4th Street for over 120 years, the Clinton Chapel has withstood the test of time, a significant feat in a Downtown that has lost many early structures. While other old churches of various denominations still stand throughout the city, the 14-pew Clinton Chapel is the oldest original church building in Modesto.

The first mention of Modesto's A.M.E. Zion Church in early newspapers was on March 3, 1902 in the Daily Evening News, when it was announced plans were underway to gauge local interest in establishing a branch of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church. It was Reverend A.J. Woodward, from Oakland, who the 1902 A.M.E. Conference sent to lead the organizing efforts in Modesto, which were fruitful as a new branch, were successfully organized under Trinity A.M.E. Zion Church by the end of March 1902.

By April 1902, the newly organized congregation had begun fundraising, seeking \$300 to purchase the "Carman property" on 4th Street between J and K Streets. The property looks to

have been successfully purchased by Reverend Woodward's congregation by the end of May 1902. At this point, the structure was expanded to accommodate services for the new A.M.E better.

Zion Church members. On October 22, 1902, the new church was formally dedicated by Reverend Bishop George Wylie Clinton (1859-1921), an influential and prominent member of the Church that traveled to Modesto from Charlotte, North Carolina, for the dedication. In honor of the esteemed bishop, the church was renamed the Clinton A.M.E. Church during the ceremony.

From that point onward, you could say the rest was history for the Clinton A.M.E. Zion Church. The Modesto Bee in 2004 rightly referred to the Clinton Chapel as a "survivor," and the church continues to stand proudly in the same place it has for well over a century. **Sunday Services are offered starting at 10:45 AM, and call (209) 846-9235 for more information.**
