

David Seymour was born in Modesto, and raised in Turlock. Previously a history professor at Merced College, he now teaches at Modesto Junior College. He joined as a director of the McHenry Museum & Historical Society in 2017, and served as president of the board from 2019 to 2021. He was then hired as executive director in 2021. His passion for local history was nurtured by his late mother and grandmother. The goal of his work is to inspire others locally to learn more about their local history in appreciation of our community's comprehensive identity.

In 2020, he took over the duties of writing monthly historical articles for the historical society. In January of 2021, it was suggested he work on a Modesto love story for the February 2021 edition. He recalled that the street his mother was raised on, Carol Street, was named after its subdivision builder's wife. The builder of the Edgewood Height Estates subdivision was Lance Ellis. He initiated contact with Renee Ellis, daughter of the late Lance and Carol Ellis.

Renee Ellis informed David about her father's work, and how each of the streets of his subdivisions were named after family members. She took him on a tour through the city, pointing out the names of the streets and the family connection. Named streets are a lasting legacy to leave in honoring members of one's family.

David will be presenting the Ellis story at the August meeting of the Genealogical Society of Stanislaus County.







STANISLAUS COUNTY REFERENCE MATERIAL AT THE STANISLAUS COUNTY LIBRARY

Did you know that the library reference staff has a computerized index of obituaries from the Modesto Bee? It is on their computers at the front desk and they can search it for you. You just need the name and at least the year of death. It will give you the date and page number where the obituary can be found if available and you can find it on the microfilmed Modesto Bee.

The library office has the city and county directories starting in 1910 up until present. There are a few pages from directories 1867-1893 that mainly list just names and occupations with some years missing. If you come in on Mondays from noon to 4 pm I can get them for you to look at in the Special Collections room.

In the Alcove room of the Special Collections room we have all the Stanislaus County specific books and all of the Modesto high school yearbooks starting with Modesto High School in 1911. There is also the MJC Buccaneer 1922-1960, La Loma Jr. High 1967-1991 and Roosevelt Jr. High 1940-1981.

The Stanislaus county specific books include The History of Stanislaus County, California by Tinkham along with an every name index done by our genealogy society, and also Stories of Stanislaus by Sol P. Elias with a separate index done by GSSC. There are 11 volumes of Cemeteries of Stanislaus County that were published by our society and also an index of Burial Permits of Stanislaus County 1889-1948. Our society also did census indexes for Stanislaus County for the years 1860-1910. A good substitute we have for the missing 1890 census is the California 1890 Great Register, a 3 volume set. It covers all of California and is taken from voter lists and includes names, ages, birthplace and residence counties of voters.

There is also a 3 binder set of the 1984 Historic Building Survey which has historic homes in Modesto by street address. It has photos and the architectural styles, description, original owners and present owner as of 1984.

We also have a Designated Modesto Landmarks Binder which has photos and descriptions of 52 landmarks including the McHenry Mansion and the Modesto Arch.

This is but a small sample of what is available at the library and in Special Collections. Volunteers from our society are there on Mondays from noon to 4 pm. Books in the room can not be checked out. If coming on a different day just let the librarians at the front desk know that you want to do research in the room and they will let you in. Hope to see you there!

FamilySearch Library Opens Free Memories Preservation Service

A press release from FamilySearch offers a valuable new service:

The FamilySearch Library in Salt Lake City, Utah, has opened a new, free service where guests can bring their personal and family records and artifacts and convert them to digital formats for easier sharing and long-term keeping. The feature is called The Family Memories Preservation Center, or Memory Lane. Visitors can convert

family documents, home movies, slides, negatives, video and audio tapes, and other media to digital formats to better preserve them against loss and to make them more readily accessible to other family members or friends.

“Every family probably has photo albums or boxes of photos or old video tapes and reel-to-reel films they have produced or acquired through the years. The Memory Lane service is a great opportunity to ensure those family memories will be preserved and available for future generations,” said Debbie Gurtler, FamilySearch assistant library director.

The machines and technology available to convert old media to digital are surprisingly fast. “I brought a box of family photos and did 150 in about an hour and a half or so. You can put them all into a stack without worrying about the different sizes, place them on one of the self-feeding photo scanners, and they just automatically feed through. It’s hard to imagine how quick it can be with the high-speed scanners,” added Gurtler.

How The Family Memories Preservation Center Works

Instructions are available with each device, and volunteers and library staff are available to help visitors learn how to use any of the equipment if needed. Thumb (portable USB) drives are available for free but may not have sufficient memory for large projects. Visitors with films, videos, and large quantities of things to digitize are encouraged to bring their own flash drives or portable hard drives. Files can also be loaded directly to a patron’s personal online storage location like Google Drive and iCloud.

If applicable, digitized files can also be attached to people on the FamilySearch Family Tree via FamilySearch Memories. In Memories, they can be organized by topic, preserved as a slideshow or album, or used as sources for life sketches.

Why Old Media Should Be Transferred to Digital

Some people may not be aware that CD-ROMs and DVDs do not have permanent shelf life, showing notable signs of degradation after a just a few years if not stored properly. Not to mention technology needed to view these media types will eventually become obsolete. Once converted, digital files can be transferred quite easily to a home computer or other storage media of choice.

The FamilySearch Library is a popular tourist destination for people seeking to make family discoveries and personal connections. FamilySearch and its predecessors have been helping preserve and provide access to the world’s genealogical records since 1894. The FamilySearch Library Memory Lane service is a free extension of these services for individuals and families to preserve and share their own family memories for generations to come.

One guest recently transferred her grandfather’s self-recorded life story from tapes to a digital file. Time had rendered four of the dozen tapes inoperable, but she was able to successfully digitize the rest. She said her cousins and family members are waiting for this—to hear his voice with his distinctive Cockney accent sharing memories. He was born in London and moved to Bountiful, Utah, but he retained his accent, she shared with a smile.

Walk-ins are welcome, but a reservation is recommended to be sure the needed equipment will be available. For more details about the types of equipment available and how to make optimum use of the facility, go to FamilySearch Memories Preservation Center.



For you to be born today from 12 previous generations, you needed a total of 4,094 ancestors over the last 400 years.



Tools To Assist You on “How to Research Your Genealogy”.

Nearly all of us here are somehow doing something with genealogy. This article intended to direct you to some of tools that will make that job a little bit easier. The LDS Church has a great program to assist you with your genealogical research and it is free. In addition, you need not worry that they will be recruiting you into their membership. I have used their services for over 30 years and never once been approached for membership. I have, however, received some exceptional help from their volunteer members with my genealogical research.

The following is a guide they provide on-line that will give you excellent direction for your research.

You will find information about our nearby Center on El Vista at the bottom of page one (1) of our newsletter.

Should you be unable to provide a genealogical recording database program LDS can provide you access to their Family Search program which is excellent **BUT** it is open to all as an open-source program. This means anyone with an account can see, use and/or modify information in your established tree.

On my first trip to the Salt Lake City LDS Library with our society I had just signed up for my FamilySearch account so that I could record my research at the library “on the fly”. I entered all of my grandfather’s information then took a break. I returned from my break and opened my tree and his information was changed. I changed it back to what was correct and within a minute it was again changed. I called the church elder over and told him what had just happened. I then again made the correction. As we both watched it was again adjusted to something incorrect. He then got on to his administrative account and looked up who was making the changes and gave me her name asking if I knew her. I did not. He thought for a moment and asked if I had anything unique I could add. I then added my grandfather’s photograph and entered it. Problem solved! Whoever she was she must have then realized that we were working with different subjects, and I have not encountered that since.
