I hope that we all, Celebrated Women's History Month in March ...I celebrated by reading an article in the Smithsonian Magazine about "Sojourner Truth." What a fascinating legacy she has left behind. In 2009, a bust of her was unveiled in the U.S. Capitals Emancipation Hall. Today, memorials to her stand throughout the United States from the campus at the University of California, San Diego, to Florence, Massachusetts, where the city recently installed a historical marker honoring her suffragist activism. New York's Sojourner Truth State Park, a 500 acre campus that includes vistas of the Hudson River Valley where she was born, opened in 2002 and continues to develop. A statue at the State University of New York at New Paltz is currently in limbo. Hudson Valley artist Trina Greene created the sculpture, which shows Truth at the moment she left slavery on foot, carrying her child Sophia and a few belongings. I want to read more about this lady! What a life she led.

We Are Looking For A Volunteer

California Revealed is a State Library initiative that helps California's heritage organizations digitize and provide long-term online access and preservation to collections and objects significant to California history (e.g., books, documents, newspapers, and audiovisual recordings). We also provide access and preservation services for existing digital collections and in-house digitization programs.

Each year, California Revealed issues an open call for organizations to nominate their collections related to California history for Digitization & Preservation Assistance:

- Partner organizations nominate materials to be digitized (or existing digital collections to be ingested) and published online by California Revealed
- Partners provide metadata descriptions for the materials
- With LSTA funding, the State Library supports free digitization (using selected vendors nationwide), online hosting for public access, and digital preservation
- Partners receive their own page on the California Revealed website that displays their digital collections
- Materials are discoverable through the California Revealed website, the Internet Archive, the Digital Public Library of America, Calisphere, WorldCat, and the Home Movie Registry
- Partners receive copies of the files and fulfill user requests for high-resolution files

Our Society has approximately 14 cemetery books that should be digitized. Lewis Ruddick was able to digitize one volume when Vicki Wolff discovered she had the "flats" for that cemetery book making copying and posting possible with available equipment. We need to do the same for our remaining volumes. If one of our members has grant writing skills it would be greatly appreciated if that individual would step up and write a grant for the digitizing of our GSSC cemetery books and Tinkham Stanislaus County index. Your editor does not have the time to do so.

I've got to tell you, MyHeritage has outdone themselves.

I had a hard time just keeping track of their announcements, which totaled 13 – a baker's dozen.

However, there are a few things not in the video, so let's take a look at a quick summary of what's new.

DNA Uploads with Free Advanced Tools Forever Extended Until March 10th

MyHeritage just extended their DNA upload that includes ALL ADVANCED TOOLS FOR FREE, forever, to March 10th so click here now to upload every kit you manage. This is a great deal. Hint – new ethnicity results are coming soon and you'll be saving \$29 on each kit you upload.

20+ Billion Records

MyHeritage has just passed the 20 billion record mark and is continuing to add. That's billion, with a B. These records are available to customers with a MyHeritage subscription. If you don't have a subscription, you can try a MyHeritage Subscription with a Free Trial, here.,

Additionally, right now, subscriptions are 50% off, but I don't know how long that price lasts.

I love my MyHeritage subscription, and if you try it and don't like yours, you can cancel and be charged nothing during the 14-day trial period.

I particularly like that the local newspaper where my grandparents lived is available on MyHeritage, and no place else. In addition, MyHeritage has integrated with FamilySearch, which is digitizing and indexing records like wildfire. That collaboration has provided me with information from European sources, including archives.

MyHeritage Wiki

MyHeritage has been working on their new Wiki, a community encyclopedia for genealogy and DNA, for almost a year now, although it was only recently released.

Y-DNA Ask Me Anything at FamilyTreeDNA

The Y-DNA "Ask Me Anything" session began at 10:30. I don't think attendees realized that FamilyTreeDNA brought the R&D brain trust and you could literally ask them anything. What an opportunity!
