Barbara Torres will give a brief history on the 1869 residence that housed 3 families over the course of 100+ years. I can talk about the Oakdale Historical Society (1985 to 2007) and how Friends of Oakdale Heritage was formed in 2009 and is now celebrating 15 years of sharing Oakdale history. We're currently focusing on our greatest strength, which is assisting visitors with their historical research questions. We recently revamped and dedicated an entire room to housing the bound copies of the Oakdale Wheat Grower, Oakdale Graphic and Oakdale Leader, dating back to the mid 1880's. Most of these were put on microfilm and have been digitized by Newspapers.com. We have OHS yearbooks dating back to 1899. Our filing cabinets are full of surname files, businesses and what we've termed "Oakdale Life" (events, celebrations, city governments, clubs and organizations). We've also just finished publication on our first Arcadia book about Oakdale, CA....and have our first cemetery walk planned for October 5th.

### The 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of D-Day

June 6, 2024, will mark the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings along the Normandy coast of France during World War II. This event, which ultimately led to the liberation of Europe, will be commemorated at Normandy American Cemetery.

Nearly every member of our Society will have a family member who was somehow associated with this historical event in our Nation's or they themselves will have been. This event occurred on my second birthday. My memory about that time was the keen interest my family had in listing to the war news on the radio.

This was the time of my life that became imprinted upon me. There were many public events that commended our country and our way of life. Perhaps the best were the parades and in our small town we had several. I remember my paternal grandmother telling me that I was the first child born to a veteran of WWII for VFW Post 1900

Later in life I was to learn that my Alexander uncle Frank had gone into France ahead of the invasion in support of General George S. Patton's Third Army, which conducted a highly successful rapid armored drive across France. His unit had no special designation such as "Green Berets" or "Special Forces". Uncle Frank told me, "they were just American soldiers doing their job to win the war and come back home!" My uncle told me of their support by the French and hiding their vehicles under piles of hay in fields during the day to avoid detection by the German military as they plotted the route across France and into German. Fortunately Uncle Frank made it home at the end of the war. Of course, none of this was ever heard on those great a.m. radio broadcasts.

Most Americans do not realize that there were five beaches involved in the Normandy invasion that were crossed as well as an Airborne assault.

Utah Beach Gold Beach Juno Beach Sword Beach and Omaha Beach - the bloodiest of the invasion caused by rough surf which allowed only two of the 29 amphibious tanks to reach the shore. The Airborne assault began first at night and 5 hours before the coastal landings. A force of more than 13 000 soldiers fro

The Airborne assault began first at night and 5 hours before the coastal landings. A force of more than 13,000 soldiers from England, Canada and the United States. They were then followed by 4,000 more in gliders carrying support materials for the earlier wave.

The full invasion began at 6:30 A.M. when more than 160,000 Allied forces landed. During the next 24 hours 9,000 Allied soldiers would be killed or wounded.

An estimated 6,000 German soldiers were lost but the number may be much higher as Hitler did not allow his Generals to make a proper count.

Decoding the German computer known as Enigma, then keeping that decoding device breaking a secret, was one of the most brilliant strategies that came out of World War II. Early during the war, a team of Polish and British experts deciphered Germany's Enigma. Before entering the war U.S. military developed its own superior code machine named SIGABA. Its code remains unbroken.

Knowledge gained from mastering Enigma greatly assisted during the D-Day Invasion.

This was the beginning of the end to Adolf Hitler's Nazi reign over Europe.

# We Are Still Looking For A Volunteer

California Revealed is a State Library initiative that helps California's heritage organizations digitize and provide long-term online access and preservation to collections and objects significant to California history (e.g., books, documents, newspapers, and audiovisual recordings). We also provide access and preservation services for existing digital collections and in-house digitization programs.

Each year, California Revealed issues an open call for organizations to nominate their collections related to California history for Digitization & Preservation Assistance:

• Partner organizations nominate materials to be digitized (or existing digital collections to be ingested) and published online by California Revealed

Partners provide metadata descriptions for the materials

• With LSTA funding, the State Library supports free digitization (using selected vendors nationwide), online hosting for public access, and digital preservation

• Partners receive their own page on the California Revealed website that displays their digital collections

• Materials are discoverable through the California Revealed website, the Internet Archive, the Digital Public Library of America, Calisphere, WorldCat, and the Home Movie Registry

• Partners receive copies of the files and fulfill user requests for high-resolution files

Our Society has approximately 14 cemetery books that should be digitized. Lewis Ruddick was able to digitize one volume when Vicki Wolff discovered she had the "flats" for that cemetery book making copying and posting possible with available equipment. We need to do the same for our remaining volumes. If one of our members has grant writing skills it would be greatly appreciated if that individual would step up and write a grant for the digitizing of our GSSC cemetery books and Tinkham Stanislaus County index. Your editor does not have the time to do so.



#### **GRAVESTONE CLEANING TIPS FROM BILLIONGRAVES**

An outstanding article by Cathy Wallace can be found at the below Billion Graves link. This is the time of year when many families venture into their family cemeteries a get the urge to clean and brighten their family's stones. There is a right way and a wrong way. This fine article will provide you with the correct focus.

The following Dos and Don'ts will be reenforced in the article.

#### DON'T

Don't do anything that will damage the surface of the headstone Don't use common household cleaners Don't use strong bases or acids Don't use power tools, such as sanders or drills with wire brushes Don't sandblast Don't use power washers or pressure over 300 psi Don't use bleach Don't use cleaners with salt in them Don't rub the gravestone surface with hard-bristled brushes Don't scrape the gravestone surface with anything harder than the stone

#### DO

Do no harm!

Choose the gentlest cleaning method possible

Do read and follow product manufacturer's guidelines

Do use good safety practices

Do test small areas before cleaning the entire headstone

Do keep the stone wet as you work

Do obtain the approval of other family members

before cleaning
