Presidents Message



August Program

Dr. Talitha Agan, Modesto Junior College history professor, reports on her book Grizzlies & Gold. One hundred years ago, in August 1922, the last California grizzly bear was shot. This book seeks to shed light on the most destructive part of this decimation—the California Gold Rush. The years 1848 to 1859 represent the era in California's history when grizzlies were confronted by massive amounts of people. Still numerous at this time, the bear had to deal with the harsh actions of California's newest inhabitants. As the slowest reproducing large predator in California, it was easily eradicated, and by the 1860s the grizzly's population began diminishing, becoming extinct in certain counties as early as the 1870s. Thus the 1850s are the best time to fully understand the grizzly and its last stand in defending itself from death. A focus on California newspaper articles on the bear from 1848 to 1859 assists in shaping the Gold Rush context. Research on grizzly hunters, including the famous Grizzly Adams, and the grizzly bear and Spanish bullfights are included.



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





The National Purple Heart Honor Mission is an approved 501(c)3 non-profit organization, which supports a variety of programs to promote the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor, pay tribute to our Purple Heart recipients, and educate all Americans about our combat-wounded veterans to ensure those who sacrificed for freedom are never forgotten.
