

Summary

This full-day seminar is interactive and jam-packed with the tools necessary for successful Mexican genealogical research. The day will begin with an introduction, including an overview of Spanish language tools, historical context, jurisdictions, and fundamental resources and records. As the seminar proceeds, we will explore relevant U.S. records, Mexican civil registration and catholic church records, as well as a variety of additional resources. Finally, the day will wrap-up with a case study to demonstrate the application of the tools and information presented throughout the seminar.

Detailed Description

The full-day seminar is comprised of multiple interactive lectures, each with supplemental material (handout and/or in-class activity). Participants will gain fundamental knowledge and tools necessary to begin (or continue) research of their Mexican ancestors. The following topics will be covered:

Introduction to Mexican Genealogy Research An introduction into important foundational concepts in Mexican genealogy research (names, jurisdictions and governmental entities, language resources, etc.), as well as a brief overview of records available online.

Key U.S. Records for Mexican Research: An overview of U.S. records from the 20th century that contain information about Mexican immigrants, as well as tips for finding clues for tracing them to their origins in Mexico.

Mexican Civil Registration: A **Deep Dive** Mexican Civil Registration began in the 1860s. Since that time, these vital records have offered researchers an excellent resource for tracing ancestry in México. Learn about their history, what information you will find, as well as where to find them.

Sacred Archives: An Exploration of Mexican Catholic Church Records From the colonial period to the 20th century, parish sacramental records represent a treasure trove of genealogical information for family history researchers. In this presentation, we will review the historical context of these records, as well as practices for analyzing them to advance your research.

Alta California

Alta California ('Upper California'), also known as **Nueva California** ('New California') among other names, a province of New Spain formally established in 1804. Along with the Baja California peninsula, it had previously comprised the province of Las Californias, but was made a separate province in 1804 (named *Nueva California*). Following the Mexican War of Independence, it became a territory of Mexico in April 1822 and was renamed Alta California in 1824.

The territory included all of the present-day U.S. states of <u>California</u>, <u>Nevada</u>, and <u>Utah</u>, and parts of <u>Arizona</u>, <u>Wyoming</u>, and <u>Colorado</u>. The territory was re-combined with <u>Baja California</u> (as a single <u>departamento</u>) in Mexico's 1836 <u>Siete Leyes</u> (Seven Laws) constitutional reform, granting it more autonomy. That change was undone in 1846, but rendered moot by the outcome of the <u>Mexican–American War</u> in 1848, when most of the areas formerly comprising Alta California <u>were ceded</u> to the U.S. in <u>the treaty which ended the war</u>. In 1850, California joined the union as the <u>31st state</u>.

The <u>El Camino Real</u> trail established by the Spanish extended from <u>Mexico City</u> west to <u>Santa Fe</u>, and California, as well as east to <u>Florida</u>. To the southeast, beyond the deserts and the <u>Colorado River</u>, lay the <u>Spanish settlements in Arizona</u>. Spanish soldiers, settlers, and missionaries invaded the homelands of the <u>Indigenous peoples of California</u>, people of the <u>Great Basin</u>, and the <u>Pueblo peoples</u> in the establishment of Alta California.

Evidence of Alta California remains in the numerous Spanish place names of American cities such as <u>Las Vegas</u>, <u>Los Angeles</u>, <u>Sacramento</u>, <u>San Bernardino</u>, <u>San Diego</u>, <u>San Francisco</u>, <u>San Jose</u>, <u>Santa Ana</u>, and <u>Santa Rosa</u>.
